



David Johnson Award for Best Fellows Research Presentation

GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES

The following are the guidelines for the annual competition of the best presentation by a fellow at an annual PERC meeting.

1. The fellow being considered must present his/her study at the PERC annual meeting.
2. The presenter must still be at the level of fellow or been staff for 1 year or less.
3. Projects must be at a stage of completion in which results may be presented and must be relevant to Pediatric Emergency Medicine (PEM).
4. Projects must be initiated during the 2 year fellowship program. Protocol development and ethics approval may be obtained prior to starting fellowship but all data collection must take place during fellowship. For example, prospective data collection in a cohort study, clinical trial or survey; retrospective data collection through chart review; analysis of a pre-existing data base; or abstract/full article screening/data abstraction for a systematic review must take place during the fellowship. Also note that projects can only be submitted once for consideration of the Fellow's Research Award.
5. Those candidates wishing to be considered for the Fellow's Research Award must submit an expanded structured abstract at a minimum including the following headings:
 - a. Background (briefly describe what is already known about the subject, related to your research)
 - b. Objective (include purpose, aim or hypothesis)
 - c. Subjects and Methods (e.g., study design, description of subjects, sample size, inclusion/exclusion criteria, study setting, treatments/interventions, duration, measurement instruments used, primary and secondary outcomes, proposed data analysis)
 - d. Results (outcome of the study such as number of subjects completing/withdrawing/dropping out, results of the analysis for outcomes, negative findings)

- e. Conclusions (primary take-home messages, additional findings of importance, and future directions)
6. Abstracts must be between 500 and 1000 words (not including title and authors), and must be received by the PERC Annual Meeting abstract submission deadline (**Friday November 2nd, 2018**).
7. The fellow under consideration must be principal investigator on the project.
 - a. If the fellow is not the first author on the project, a cover letter must be included describing the fellow's role in the project and clarifying why he or she is not the first author.
8. All abstracts will be reviewed by three peer-reviewers experienced in research methodology and PEM.
9. Three candidates will be selected as semi-finalists based on the following criteria:
 - a. Scientific strength including details on study design, inclusion criteria, process and statistical methods, sample size, sampling, etc., as described in the abstract;
 - b. Abstract organization including the ease of readability and order of components; and
 - c. Clinical relevance and importance of the project to PEM.

Semi-finalist candidates will be notified by email, and are required to confirm that they will attend and present at the PERC annual meeting.
10. The three semi-finalists will present during the final session of the PERC Trainee Research Day to the full audience. The format and structure of the presentation will be the same as the other fellow's research day presentations (10 minute presentation, 10 minute question and answer session). Abstracts not selected as semi-finalists will be presented during the regular Trainee Research Day schedule.
11. Through consensus three judges will choose the winning candidate from the three semi-finalists. The winning candidate will be announced during the PERC dinner.
